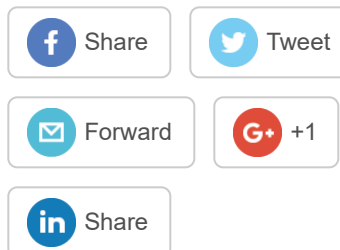

The Arkansas Bar Association and Harold Flowers Law Society promote passage of the Heir Property Act. Two statewide bar associations recently voted to add their names to the growing list of people and organizations supporting the Heir Property Act.

Heir Property Act passes in Alabama.

Legislature gives unanimous support. Earlier this year, the Alabama legislature voted unanimously in support of the Heir Property Act which their governor later signed into law. Similarly, in 2012, the Georgia legislature gave unanimous support to the Act which is now law. We welcome your support to ensure that Arkansas joins these Southern states by enacting this important legislation during our 2015 legislative session.
