Voyeurism has a negative valence to it. Veillance is of neutral valence.

- Surveillance means watching from above.
- Coveillance (Côtéveillance) means watching from the side.
- Sousveillance means watching from below.

These all have neutral valence. Voyeurism is a valence, not a veillance. For example, any of these 3 can be voyeuristic, e.g.:

- Voyeuristic surveillance (policeman watching a woman change clothes and have a bath like what happened in the UK through their street surveillance system);
- Voyeuristic coveillance;
- Voyeuristic sousveillance.

So in answer to your question, voyeurism is not the same thing as veillance. Veillance simply means simply watching (which might be for positive or negative purposes).
