Tiny Earth PIVOT: IMPACTS OF COVID-19 ON FACULTY MENTORING AND TEACHING

Tiny Earth faculty applied to participate in a week-long workshop to learn how to teach Tiny Earth content in an online format. In August 2020, we administered an online survey to understand the impact of COVID-19 on their mentoring and teaching.

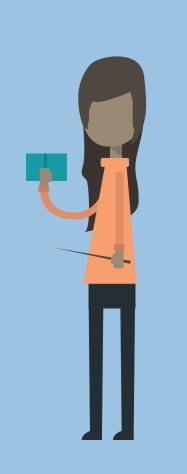

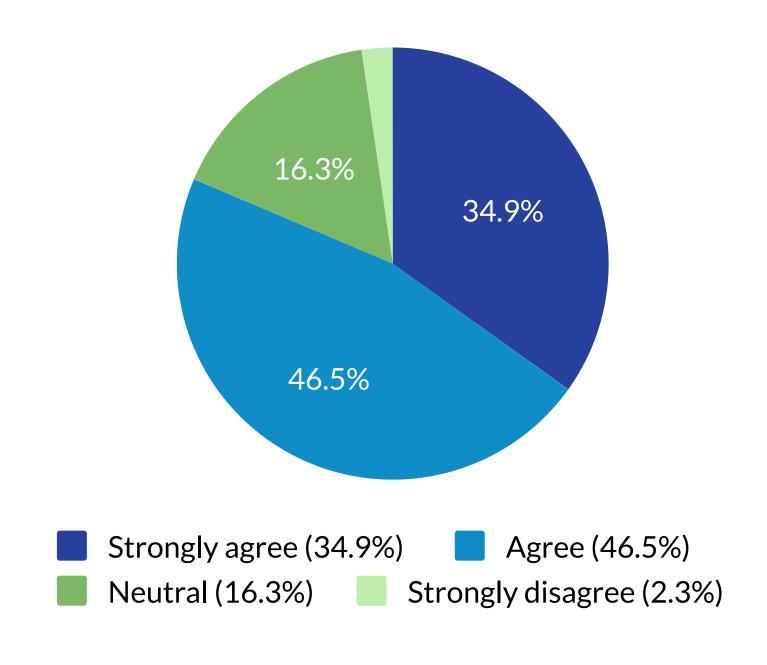


WHAT DID FACULTY TELL US?

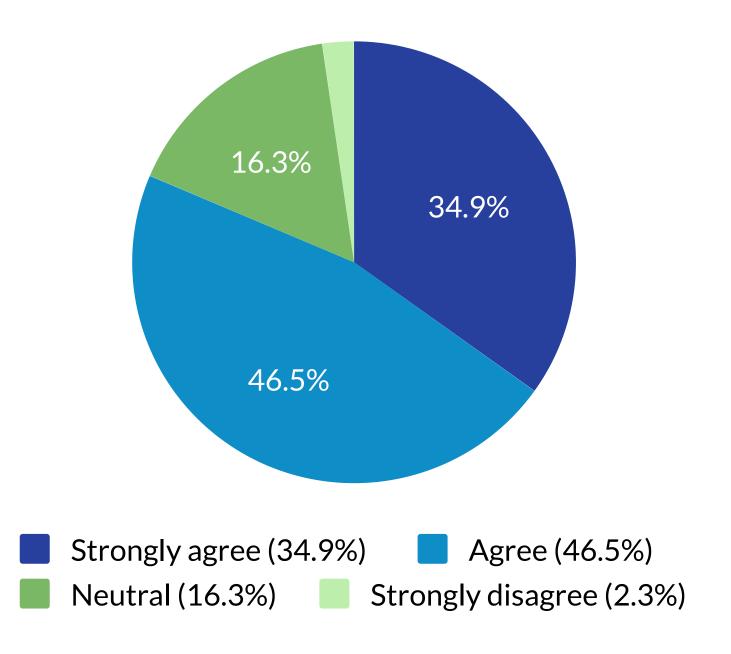
Most faculty reported that COVID-19 has impacted their ability **to work** and **to conduct research.**

Q: The COVID-19 pandemic has impacted my ability to conduct research.

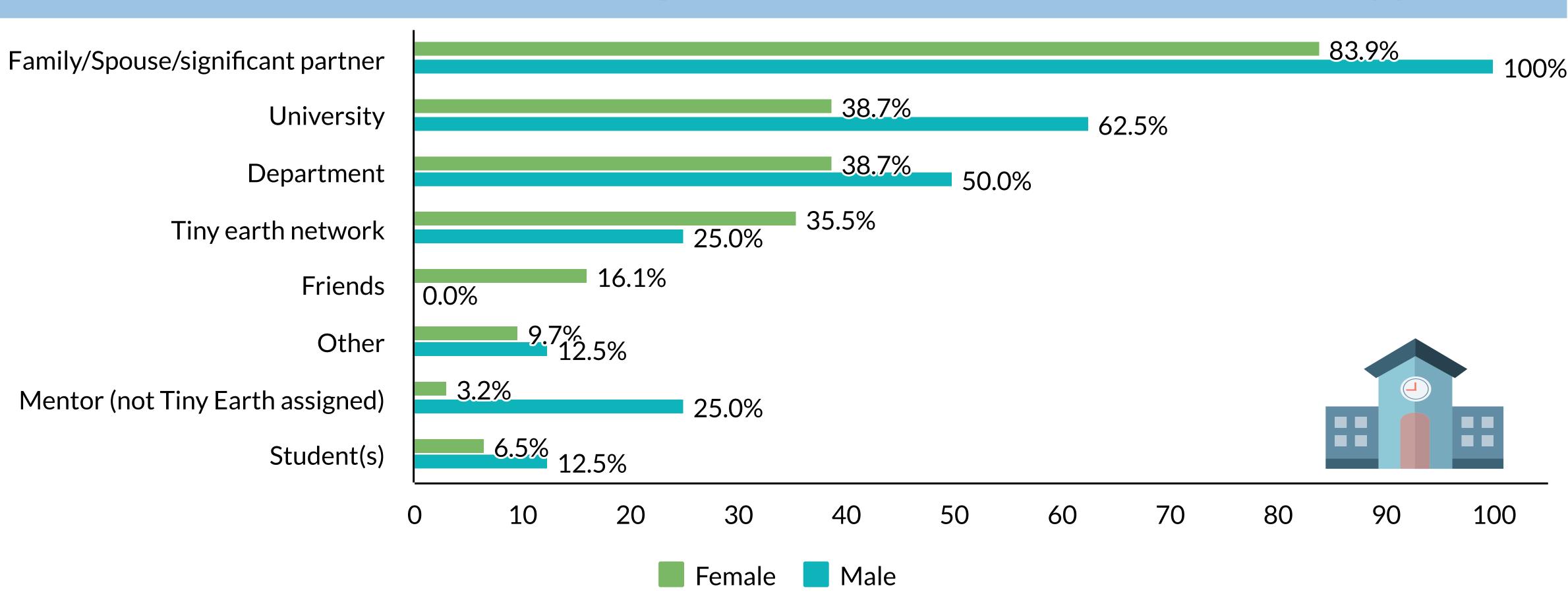






WHO IS HELPING FACULTY ADJUST DURING COVID-19?

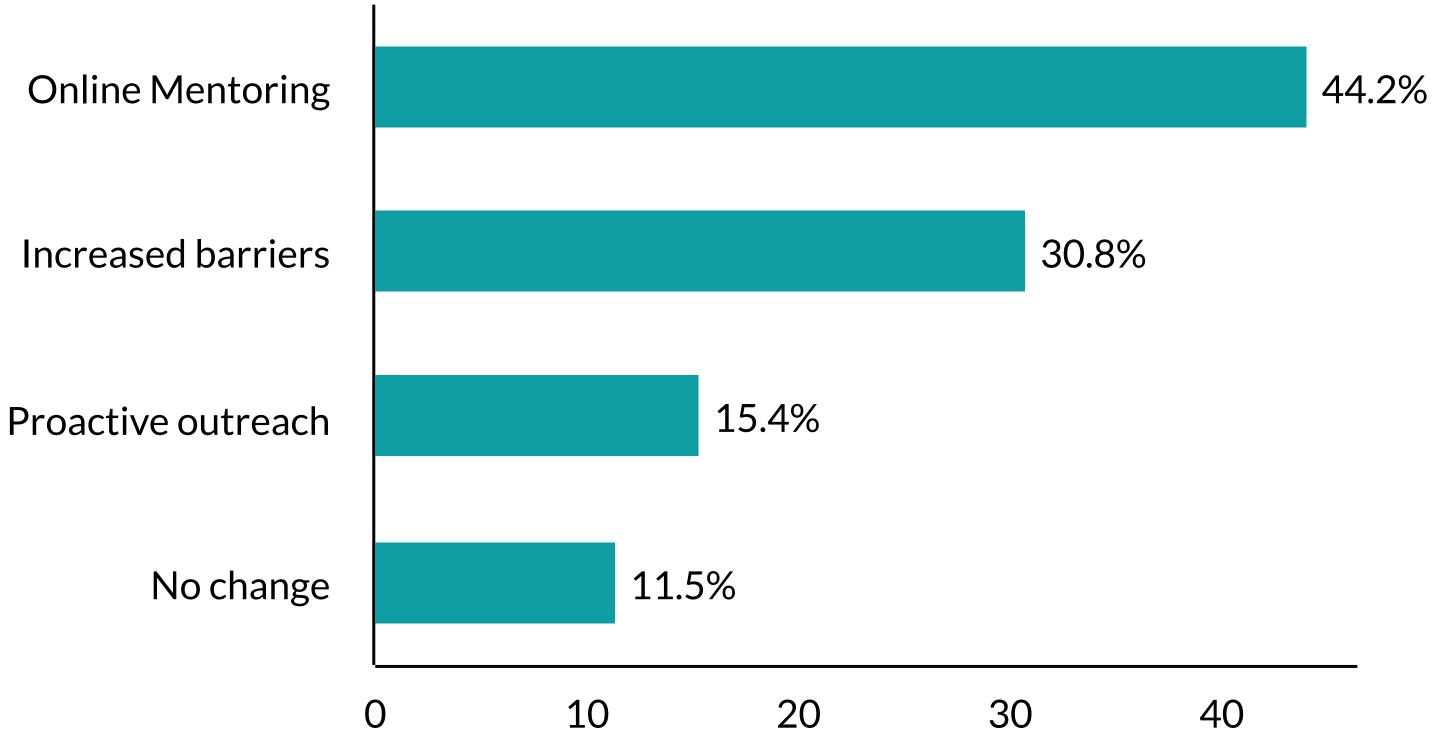
Men and women benefited from different resources. Overall, most faculty said their **family**, **university**, **and department** were valuable sources of support.



HAS COVID-19 IMPACTED MENTORING?

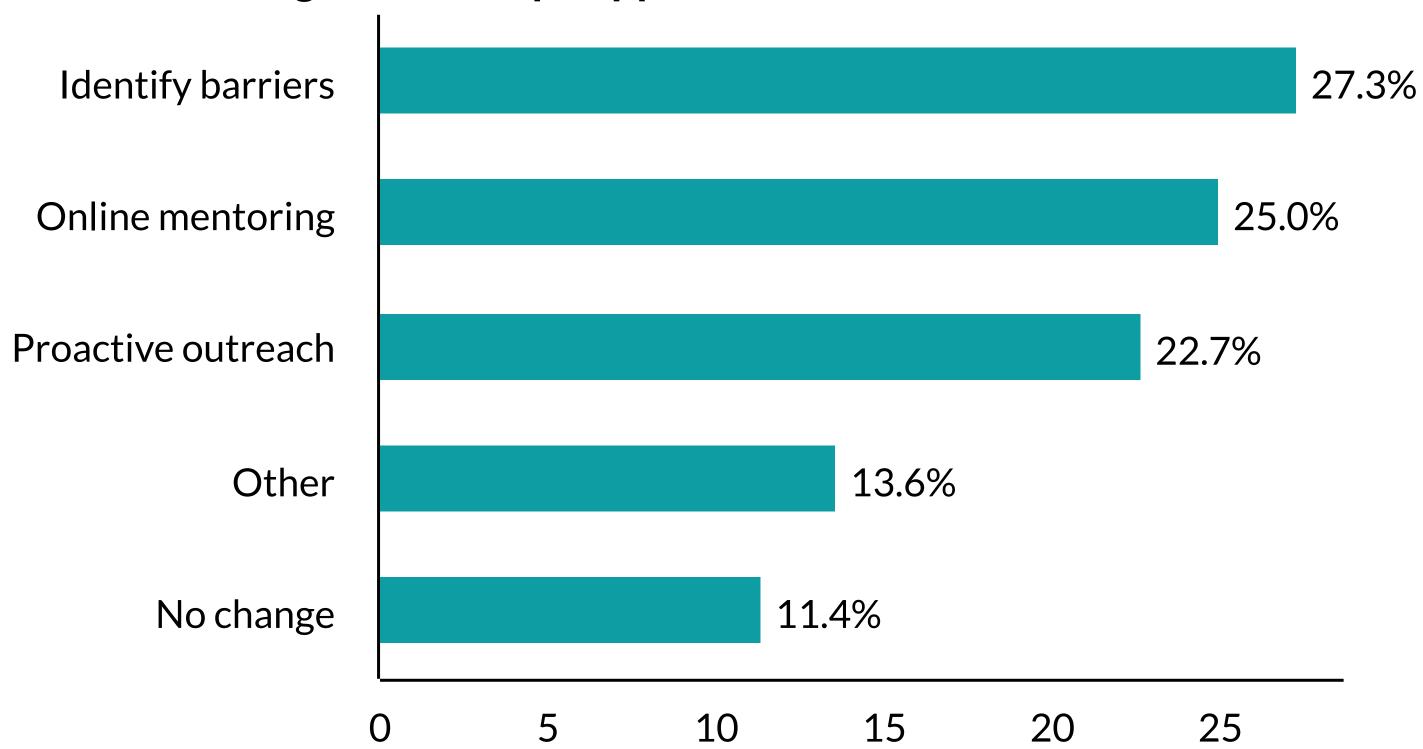
Faculty reported that COVID-19 has impacted both the ways of <u>providing and</u> <u>receiving mentoring</u>. They reported <u>more barriers</u> than opportunities.

Q: In what ways have you changed your approach to <u>providing</u> mentorship support as a result of COVID-19?



- The majority (44%) now provide mentorship online
- Some faculty now face increased barriers, such as
 - "It's difficult to reach those that might need guidance, but don't respond to emails"
- Some faculty (15%) are now more proactive in reaching out to their mentees
 - "Much more focus on one-on-one and personal connections with students"
- Other faculty (11%) have not changed their approach to mentoring

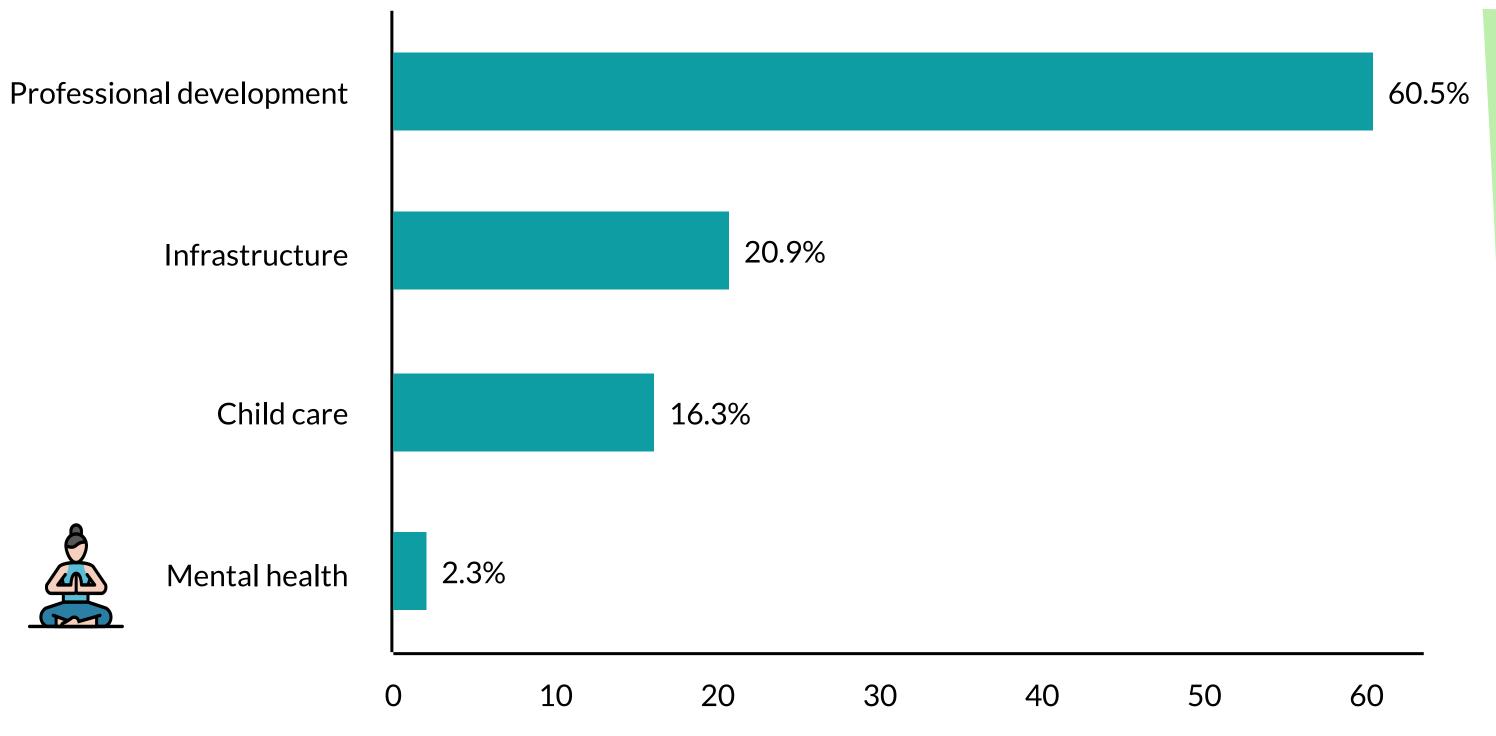
Q: In what ways have you changed your approach to seeking or receiving mentorship support as a result of COVID-19?



- The majority (27%) have experienced increased barriers as they search for or receive mentorship
 - "Interactions with my mentors have been interrupted due to their commitments"
- Some faculty (25%) now seek mentorship online
- Some faculty (23%) are now more proactive in seeking mentorship
 - "I just reach out to more people"

WHAT RESOURCES DO FACULTY NEED MOST TO ADJUST?

Most faculty reported that <u>professional development</u>, to help them adjust their class format and teaching, is what they need most.



- The majority (61%) would like professional development to help adapt to COVID-19 restrictions
 - "Online resources to flip my courses has been the biggest thing "
- Other faculty (21%) would like infrastructure
 - "New online teaching tools"
- Some faculty (16%) would appreciate child care support
 - "Consistent childcare"
